## 2003 LEGISLATIVE REVIEW

This is the Minnesota Legislative Evaluation Assembly's report on the 2003 legislative session. As seems the pattern, the lawmakers' work was not completed in the prescribed time and a special session was necessary. The matter of taxes held sway. A new governor who had campaigned, along with many of the legislators, on a promise not to raise taxes despite a looming 4 billion dollar deficit, and a positive resolving of some troublesome social issues kept final results more in line than usual with the credo of LEA.

Holding down taxes does not mean the "tax and spend" style of governing has gone out of style at the Capitol. The easy passage of a \$237 million pork barrel bonding bill in a non-bonding year is evidence of that. Horse-trading is alive and well. This is partly due to the practice, whether deliberate or not, of letting most of the fiscal issues remain in limbo at session's end. Concentrating spending into large omnibus special session spending bills that legislators cannot possibly have time to read through results in them being intimidated by the pressures to vote contrary to their own conscience. When policy matters (such as double bunking of prisoners) get lumped into omnibus bills, legislators avoid making a public stance on the merits of the policy. The public, and organizations like LEA, cannot make accurate assessments of legislators' intents and actions.

A case in point: The State Department omnibus bill had a line, of which many legislators were unaware, providing payment of \$369,000 of taxpayers' money to pay the lawyers of the four plaintiffs who brought action before the Supreme Court appointed Panel which determined the new congressional and legislative districts of 2002. This was for time allegedly spent by the lawyers in preparing redistricting proposals to present to the Panel, *though some of the proposals they presented had been drawn by regular legislative and gubernatorial employees who had been routinely and fully paid for their time and effort out of funds duly appropriated for this purpose in the 2001 and 2002 budgets.*

These lawyers, and the factions they represented, like the previous legislature itself, did not try to agree on a plan they wanted the Panel to proclaim. None of their proposals were adopted by the Panel. However, they *could* agree on two things: 1) to get their fellow lawyers to petition the Panel to order taxpayer-paid compensation for themselves, and 2) how to divide the booty. A cuddly arrangement; only it reeks! The four plaintiffs the Panel ordered paid are the state Republican party, the state DFL party, then-Senator Moe and the five then-DFL Congressmen, and Jesse Ventura. The Secretary of State would not pay, since no money was appropriated, so unnamed legislators slipped into a conference committee omnibus bill the \$369,000 appropriation.

Other factors aside, LEA raises two basic questions:

1. Suppose enough legislators had caught this item in the bill and voted not to include it. Would that mean no state payment to the plaintiffs, or could the lawyers who were to benefit then attach state property? Which is superior - A Supreme Court edict, or legislative action?
2. Who is obligated to pay those who lobby before the legislature and before court panels? The taxpayers or the interests who hire the lobbyists? This time we taxpayers footed the bill – to the tune of \$369,000.

LEA calculates percentages using the votes actually cast by each legislator and then deducting two percentage points for each time that legislator did not cast a vote. Legislator's not elected at the time of the vote (**NE**) have no such deduction. Honorees for 2003 scored 85% or higher, honorable mentions scored at least 80%.

### 1. SS HF 7. Taxes.

Sen. Pogemiller; Rep. Abrams. Probably the most important bill before the legislature this session, it respected the voters' mandate not to increase taxes. LEA favors a YES vote, however, we have some reservations because it catered to special interests, ignored principles of justice, and further obfuscated the political process. It passed in the Senate 34-29 and in the House 68-65.

### 2. HF 646. Racino.

Rep. Buesgens. The House made a concerted effort to expand the state lottery with HF 646. This bill would have provided for "gaming" machines at Canterbury racetrack. This scheme for raising money for the state passed in the House 71-60. There was not a vote in the Senate. LEA opposes state involvement in gambling, therefore, LEA favors a NO vote.

### 3. SF 484; HF 657. Counties authorized to require dedication of land or fees for parks.

Sen. Wergin; Rep. Nelson, P. This bill was supported by lobbyists for counties and by advocates of regional growth management. It expands regional government. A key premise of the bill is that those developing land for residential or commercial purposes shall pay a disproportionate share of the costs to acquire and develop parks, trails, or open space that is intended to be enjoyed by all. This is quite different from assessing developers for infrastructure upgrades made necessary by their developments. Also, there is the vague language requiring dedication fees to be "fair, reasonable, and proportionate to the need". LEA believes this bill will be a boon to lawyers and middlemen, but an impediment to developers at a time when the state is struggling for more economic development. LEA favors a NO vote. The bill passed in the House 119-5 and in the Senate 50-0.

### 4. SS HF 8. State Bonding for Building and Acquisition.

Sen. Langseth; Rep. Krinkie. Early in the session, there was talk of the state capitalizing on low interest rates to speed up the timeline for major road improvements. The Pawlenty administration and the legislative leadership ignored the budget crisis and pushed through before the close of the special session a bonding bill of \$237 million. This bill got so bloated and distorted that the House author could not vote for it. Only 12% of the money went for transportation projects, and none of that went for freeway upgrades. Instead, \$5 million was set aside for a National Sports Conference Center, \$7.5 million for "Greater Minnesota Business Development Grants," and \$25 million for rebuilding the Guthrie Theater (a privately owned company). Moorhead got money to build the Trollwood Performing Arts School, Wabasha got money to build a National Eagle Center, Saint Paul got money for upgrading the Roy Wilkins Auditorium and for constructing a "Paul and Sheila Wellstone Center for Community Building," etc. Most of these projects were vetoed

by former Governor Ventura. Unfortunately, the "pork stamp" vetoes vanished this year. LEA believes that anyone who voted for this laundry list of projects in what is traditionally not a bonding bill year should not be called fiscally responsible. LEA believes that a NO vote on this bill was commendable and should help prevent setting a new pattern of passing a large bonding bill annually. The bill passed in the Senate 49-13 and in the House 100-27.

### 5. SS HF 5. Omnibus Transportation Bill.

Rep. Kuisle. This bill handles all aspects of the state funding for transportation. Overall the bill did an excellent job of focusing money on roads and bridges, rather than transit and rail lines. The state will issue \$400 million in highway bonds to speed up highway construction. The bonds will be paid off by cuts to the Transportation Department budget. On the negative side, this bill increased the state's share of operating costs for the Hiawatha Light Rail line from 40% to 50%. Overall, however, the bill was a step in the right direction. LEA supports focusing on roads and bridges to facilitate the form of transportation used by the vast majority of citizens and favors a YES vote. The bill passed the Senate 35-27 and in the House 82-50.

### 6. HF 1. Driver's License Proof of Identity and Residency.

Rep. Stanek. HF 1, if it had passed, would have put into law the rules, adopted in July 2002 by the Minnesota's Department of Public Safety, clarifying standards for proving identity and residency. These rules would require applicants for Minnesota ID cards, driver's licenses, or permits to present primary and secondary documents for establishing identity and proof of residency. This would prohibit foreign visitors whose visas expire in 30 days or less and have no accepted applications for visa extension from being issued new ID cards, and would require that visa expiration date information be on the ID cards and licenses. LEA favors a YES vote on this bill, which was full of common-sense antiterrorism measures to tighten identity standards without sacrificing procedural safeguards. Though the bill passed the House 106-25, the Senate leadership did not allow a floor vote on it. However, the Department is going forward with implementing the portions of these rules that have not been challenged or struck down by the courts.

### 7. SS HF 9. Spent Nuclear Fuel Storage and Renewable Energy.

Rep. Westrom. This bill authorized additional dry cask spent fuel storage at the Prairie Island facility, delegated supervision to the PUC, and provides incentives for alternative energy development. LEA believes the legislation was constructive overall in that it avoids an immediate storage crisis and encourages safe and cleaner energy in the future. However, it provides financial incentives only to big utilities and the university, thus bypassing the opportunities to reward creative energy solutions from other institutions and entrepreneurs on a free market basis. On balance, LEA favors a YES vote. It passed in the Senate 40-26 and in the House 80-45.

**8. SF 872. Joint and Several Liability (Tort) Reform.**

Sen. Scheid. Previous to this bill, a defendant in a lawsuit who was found 15% at fault could be responsible for the full amount of damages awarded. This bill adjusted the 15% level responsible to a more reasonable 50% level of liability before a defendant can be held responsible for all damages. LEA supports tort reform and a YES vote. It is a general principle that an individual or business should only be held responsible for the damages they cause, and this bill is a step in that direction. The bill passed 43-22 in the Senate and in the House 80-51.

**9. SF 842. Conceal and Carry (MN Personal Protection Act).**

Sen. Pariseau. Rep. Boudreau. The Minnesota Personal Protection Act was amended onto a minor natural resources bill in the House in order to get it directly to the Senate floor. This was necessary because some members of the Senate were attempting to bottle it up in committee. This bill establishes a uniform standard for issuing conceal carry permits. The provision is a positive step in securing each citizen’s right to “keep and bear arms.” LEA supports this bill and a YES vote. After many years, this bill was passed and signed into law. It passed in the Senate 37-30 and in the House 88-46.

**10. Limmer Amendment/Entenza Motion - Sexual Orientation.**

Sen. Limmer; Rep. Entenza. Sexual orientation laws infringe on our freedoms of speech, religion, and association. Public schools should not promote sexual activity. Sen. Limmer’s proposed amendment to the Omnibus Education Bill would have prohibited the teaching of homosexuality or bisexuality in the public schools. The amendment failed by a vote of 19-41. LEA favors a YES vote. In the House, LEA scored the Entenza motion to suspend the rules in order to consider a resolution aimed at condemning Rep. Lindner for his comments about sexual behavior. The

purpose of the resolution was to limit discussion and free speech. The motion failed on a 41-76 vote. LEA favors a NO vote.

**11. SF 187. Woman’s Right To Know Act.**

Sen. Dille; Rep. Seifert. “Right to Know” requires that specific information be given to a woman contemplating an abortion. LEA has always favored Right to Know and supports a YES vote. After many years, this bill finally was passed and has become law. It passed in the Senate 41-24 and in the House 90-39.

**12. SF 481; HF 302. Repeal the Profile of Learning.**

Sen. Kelley; Rep. Sykora. The Profile of Learning, also known as the state’s new graduation rule, emphasized process over content and skills. LEA favors a YES vote to eliminate the Profile and after many years we are pleased to report it was finally repealed. The repealer passed in the Senate 64-3 and in the House 125-9.

**13. SF 296; HF 517. Children, Families, and Learning Department Renaming.**

Sen. Michel; Rep. Demmer. This bill properly separates education from social services. Some of the functions included under the old CFL were delegated to other state agencies. LEA favors a YES vote. The bill passed in the Senate 41-19 and in the House 131-2.

**14. SF 287; HF 408. Pledge of Allegiance.**

Sen. Murphy; Rep. Anderson, B. This bill requires the recitation of the Pledge in schools. It includes a provision allowing local school boards to waive the requirement and any individual may opt out. Public schools have an obligation to teach students about the values of the society they live in, to encourage good citizenship, and patriotism. LEA favors a YES vote. The bill passed in the Senate 58-5 and in the House 117-12.
