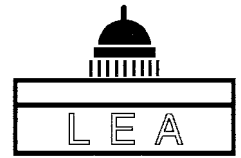

2006 LEGISLATIVE REVIEW

The Legislative Evaluation Assembly's (LEA's) basic concepts of constitutionalism, limited government, free enterprise, and legal and moral order seem to have a rocky going year after year in our legislative bodies. As LEA informs the public on how each legislator voted, it is evident the principles in our credo are not held by all of the people's elected representatives. Bills and proposals embodying them are defeated or set aside.

Friction between the Senate and House, prominent in previous sessions, continued. The Senate deliberately ignored some actions of the House. Yet at times the lawmakers became bogged down in trivia, such as it appears they did not know they passed two unrelated bills with identical language deeding land to the City of Bemidji.

Constantly loading the state with debt through bonding seems to be taken for granted. Loading the taxpayers of the rest of the state for the ineptness of the Minneapolis Teachers' Retirement Association is irresponsible. And, LEA considers extremely irresponsible the legislature's

voting that the state shall pay over \$80,000 an acre for rural land, some of which was probably permanently contaminated by Gopher Ordnance manufacturing in World War II, just to gain a new stadium at the Minneapolis campus of the University.

Governor Pawlenty failed to use the veto pen to defend a clear vision of the proper size of government. He acted more like a legislator who felt he could not "in good faith" veto anything out of the billion-dollar bonding bill because he had participated in negotiating its details. He vetoed only \$1.5 million out of a \$202 million supplemental appropriations bill. Moreover, he did not threaten a veto of the localized tax proposal for a Twins stadium, even though it met the legal obligation to be subjected to a local referendum.

LEA is glad to acknowledge and especially commend the three Senators and seven Representatives in their voting most consistently for the basic concepts of LEA.

2006 VOTES

1. Marriage Amendment Motion

SF 2992. Sen. Nienow. This bill is a duplicate of the bill authored by Senator Michele Bachmann for a constitutional amendment to define marriage only as involving one man and one woman. Senator Nienow made a motion to pull the bill from the Judiciary Committee to the Senate floor. It failed 30-35. LEA favored a YES vote. The House had already voted on the amendment last year and LEA scored that vote in its 2005 report.

2. Increase Reporting and Restricting State Funding for Abortions

HF 3258. Rep. Brod. This bill would require the reporting of abortion data on minors and women under guardianship. It would prohibit state funding of abortions except as required by the courts. It passed the House 81-50. LEA favored a YES vote.

In the Senate the provisions of this bill were incorporated into the Omnibus Supplemental Bill. Senator Cohen moved to amend the bill by striking these provisions. His motion prevailed by a vote of 35-32. LEA favored a NO vote on the Cohen motion.

3. Omnibus Bonding Bill

HF 2959. Sen. Langseth; Rep. Dorman. This year's bonding bill is just under \$1 billion in spending (\$999.98 million) although the state treasury

has a \$1 billion surplus. Why bond when there is a surplus? LEA disagrees with the size of the bonding bill and with large expenditures that are not state responsibilities. Examples include millions of dollars for: the Northstar commuter rail line, various zoo projects, a community center in Minneapolis, the Shubert Theater, the Ordway, development of an Itasca County steel mill and bioscience grants. It passed in the Senate 60-6 and in the House 111-21. LEA favored a NO vote.

4. Eminent Domain

SF 2750. Sen. Bakk, Rep. Johnson, J. Eminent Domain has been abused in Minnesota as a form of legalized taking of property by the collusion of developers and city planners in violation of the protection of property rights of the owners. The Supreme Court decision (*Kelo v. New London*) left this issue to the states and has led to a public demand that the Legislature pass a law restricting the use of eminent domain, which the Bakk-Johnson Bill does.

Private property rights are the foundation of liberty and true economic development. The use of eminent domain, except for a public purpose, is a flagrant violation of the intent of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, which in Jefferson's words, are the rights the people have "against" the government. This bill passed in the Senate 56-9. LEA favored a YES vote there.

For the House, LEA chose to score the vote on the stricter amendment offered by Rep. Krinkie that would have specifically forbidden taking land for “economic development” or “enhancing tax revenues.” LEA favored a YES vote on this amendment. That vote failed in the House 58-76, but the bill without the amendment passed decisively.

5. Bailout of the Minneapolis Teachers’ Retirement Fund

SF 1057, HF 1120. Sen. Pogemiller, Rep. Ozment. Due to mismanagement the Minneapolis Teachers’ Retirement Fund Association (MTRFA) has been deeply in debt. This bill merged the MTRFA with the Minnesota Teachers Retirement Association (MTRA), thereby transferring the MTRFA’s large debt into the state fund. School districts will be assessed a 0.5 percent increase starting July 1st to pay off the large debt. This forces taxpayers around the state to pay for the debt incurred by the mismanaged Minneapolis fund. Furthermore, there are no incentives to improve the practices that led to the large debt and held no one responsible. It passed in the Senate 37-26 and in the House 95-34. LEA favored a NO vote.

6. Constitutional Amendment Dedicating Sales Taxes for Environment and Arts

SF 2734, HF 1909. Sen. Sams, Rep. Hackbarth. LEA is opposed to any constitutional amendment that would dedicate general funds for a specific purpose. Dedication infringes on the executive branch’s authority to shift priorities and spend or impound funds based on changing assessments of critical public needs. In the Senate, LEA is scoring the worst of the dedicated-funds proposals that simultaneously increase the state sales tax by three-eighths of a percent and dedicate those funds to “natural and cultural resource purposes.” It passed 42-22. LEA favored a NO vote. LEA has chosen not to score the House vote. Thankfully, no final bill emerged from conference committee and the talk of a special session for this has stopped.

7. Twins Baseball Stadium

SF 2297, HF 2480. Sen. Kelley, Rep. Finstad. Unable or unwilling to resist years of endless lobbying, the legislature capitulated and subsidized a private, professional sports team. Legislators found it appealing to give away other people’s money under the guise that it was an economic benefit to the community. This was done despite the major studies that show there is no economic benefit to cities that have pro sports teams. While citizens have been assured that this enterprise will not leave Minnesota, there are no guarantees. Yet taxpayers are subsidizing millionaires and private enterprises.

The legislature further disgraced itself by exempting this bill from the state law’s requirement to allow local citizens to vote on tax increases. This burdens the citizens of Hennepin County with a tax despite assurances that keeping the team was good for the entire state. It passed in the Senate 34-32 and in the House 71-61. The governor held a signing ceremony for it on the field of the Metrodome. LEA favored a NO vote.

8. Gopher Football Stadium

SF 2460, HF 263. Sen. Pogemiller, Rep. Abrams. By funding a University stadium, the legislators threw money at a problem that did not exist. The original Memorial Stadium was replaced by a large, climate-controlled stadium to attract athletes and fans. This so-called rational process has now been reversed by a different set of administrators and developers. The arguments that a new stadium would attract more fans and produce more revenue are without merit, given the history, limited size, and location of the approved stadium plan. The irony is that the U of M officials who demanded a stadium refused to dip into their swollen coffers or include it in their regular budget to fund it.

The desire of MN citizens to build another Gopher stadium was so weak that a shell game, using government land in exchange for government land, was used to induce citizen and legislative support. Result: the state (its taxpayers) will pay over \$80,000 per acre for rural land, some probably

permanently contaminated by the World War II Gopher Ordnance project, for parks and riding trails. This bill passed in the Senate 43-24 and in the House 96-37. LEA favored a NO vote.

9. Light Rail

SF 3246, HF 3342. Sen. Betzold, Rep. Tingelstad. The MN legislature, unable to learn the painful lessons of passenger rail from the failed experiments from the rest of the world, continued with their reckless adventures in waste, fraud and deception. This \$60 million plan (this is in addition to what was proposed in the transportation bill) for the continued expansion of a black hole program assures the citizens of the area, which passenger rail serves, that their commutes will continue to be obstructed, expensive, and without hope. It passed in the Senate 57-5, and in the House 94-38. LEA favored a NO vote.

10. Illegal Protection of Illegal Aliens

SF 2771, HF 2576. Sen. Wergin, Rep. Knobloch. This bill would have put an end to city ordinances that give sanctuary to illegal aliens. It would require cooperation among law enforcement agencies. When laws are broken, all government agencies should take proper action and not arbitrarily refuse to enforce certain laws. There was no Senate vote. It passed in the House 94-37. LEA favored a YES vote.

11. Resident Tuition for Illegal Aliens

Sen. Pappas’ Second Amendment on SF 2994. This is the second year the Senate’s bill for higher education included this provision. Minnesota residents pay lower college tuition at state colleges than students from outside of the state. This amendment would have allowed illegal aliens to pay in-state tuition rates. The state should enforce our immigration laws, not reward lawbreakers. It passed in the Senate 37-28. LEA favored a NO vote. There was no House vote.

12. ID Needed to Obtain a Driver’s License

HF 3014. Rep. Smith. This bill would have required the use of primary documents in order to obtain driver’s licenses, permits, and identification cards, thereby reducing the ability of individuals to obtain a driver’s license under a false identity. Driver’s licenses are the most common form of identification and LEA supports insuring their validity. LEA favored a YES vote. The bill passed in the House 100-28. There was no Senate vote.

13. Longer Residency Requirements

SF 3777, HF 3002. Sen. Koch, Rep. Emmer. This bill would have extended from 60 to 90 days the minimum residency requirement to be eligible for welfare. Our liberal requirements for social services are attracting welfare recipients from other states at Minnesota’s expense. Extension of the time requirement would act as a deterrent. It passed in the House 94-37. LEA favored a YES vote. There was no Senate vote.

14. Omnibus Election Bill

SF 2743, HF 3110. Sen. Hottinger, Rep. Westrom. This bill is essentially an omnibus election bill. Its original form in the House was a pure voting systems bill. Unfortunately, the Senate version prevailed and while the bill maintained ballot protections that were already codified, the additions were *all* objectionable and none of the previous problems were corrected.

Examples of onerous additions:

1) Felons are now allowed to vote without having civil rights restored. They simply sign a polling place roster stating the sentence has expired, been completed or the sentence discharged.

2) Poll challenges of persons whose mail has been returned as undeliverable or unacknowledged in the case of registered mail are not allowed.

LEA does not consider the improvement of voting machines and increased confidentiality for specific individuals sufficient cause to allow continued and increased fraud. It passed in the Senate 64-0 and in the House 129-3. LEA favored a NO vote.

15. "Communist" Grocery Stores Authorized

SF 2939, HF 3446. Sen. Johnson, D.E., Rep. Juhnke. The Legislature approved and authorized local government ownership of unviable businesses. The city of Pennock is authorized to purchase a business with four city lots to allow for expansion. The city of Kiester may acquire inventory and operate a grocery store. No local taxpayer approval is required for this state socialist action. It passed in the Senate 54-9 and in the House 103-30. LEA favored a NO vote.

16. Restricting Sale/Rental of Video Games to Minors

SF 785, HF 1298. Sen. Pappas; Rep. Samuelson. This bill is a perfect example of how the legislature wastes its time and public resources, trying to create the false impression that it is "doing something," while imposing fines on violators. The final enactment of this bill required 40 procedural steps, including conference committee action, to produce a trivial "solution" to a serious problem, which was challenged in the courts. There it was struck down. The bill passed in the Senate 56-6 and in the House 98-33. LEA favored a NO vote because LEA supports the traditional American principles of limited government and free enterprise, not petty and onerous regulation.

17. County Positions Appointed

SF 1878, HF 3263. Sen. Ortman, Rep. Kohls. This bill extends the number to 26 of county boards that can appoint county recorders, auditors, and treasurers. It furthers the movement away from democracy and toward rule by bureaucracy. Voters' rights to elect these officials were usurped legally but against the constitutional principle of a government of, by, and for the people. While citizens have a right to hand over their government to a ruling class, this was not the type of society envisioned in the constitution. What is next? It passed in the Senate 59-4 and in the House 68-65. LEA favored a NO vote.

18. Extending the Monopoly on Radiation Facilities

SF 2532, HF 2810. Sen. Berglin, Rep. Powell. According to current law, all radiation therapy facilities must be constructed only by an entity owned and operated by a hospital. This law expires in 2008. Hospitals want their monopoly extended. On a compromise bill, the sunset was extended to 2013. How long is long enough? The opposition to the bill wanted to let someone other than a hospital build such a facility, and to let the free market operate, allowing for the possibility of lower health costs. LEA favored a NO vote. It passed in the Senate 59-7 and in the House 90-39.

19. Photo ID for Voting

SF 923, HF 1443. Sen. Bachmann, Rep. Emmer. This bill would require all voters to show a state issued Photo ID, with provisions for those unable to obtain or afford an ID. This requirement is basic to maintaining the integrity of elections. On Election Day the voters who are unable to provide such proof will have their ballots set aside for later verification. This bill requires that unverified ballots be counted without verification unless they represent 3% or more of the total ballots in a precinct. LEA believes that all ballots should be verified as eligible before they are counted. LEA favored a YES vote and looks forward to further election law reform in the next legislative session. It passed in the House 71-62. There was no Senate vote.

20. Alternative Teacher Training

SF 2764, HF 2680. Sen. Hann, Rep. Erickson. This bill would allow individuals who already have a four-year degree in the field in which they wish to teach to be certified without a degree in education. These individuals would still be required to take 9 hours of classroom management; 200 hours of instruction in standards, curriculum, and instructional strategies; on-the-job mentoring; and to pass a skills examination in reading, writing, and mathematics. This alternative path appears more rigorous than the "traditional" method now in place. There was no vote in the Senate. The bill lost in the House 62-70. LEA favored a YES vote.
